30 Years of Graduating Classes from the New Building

This past school year marked the 30th anniversary of Stuyvesant's move from the old building on E 15th Street to its new campus on Chambers Street.

In the 1980s, Principal Abraham "Abe" Baumel, along with a group of students, parents, and alumni, formed the Stuyvesant Coalition to consider the needs of their growing school community. They went through numerous ideas for improving the facilities at the old building on E 15th Street, which housed Stuyvesant students from 1907 to 1992. Emblematic of the Industrial Age, the school building designed by C. B. J. Snyder included marvelous machines, wood shops, and metalworking shops. As the Superintendent of School Buildings, Snyder viewed school buildings as civic monuments for a better society and designed them with grandeur. Alas, though the building was advanced for its time, no one expected Stuyvesant to remain there for the next 85 years, and no amount of renovation could change the fact that the building housed nearly double its 1,500-person capacity.



2023 Benefit for Stuyvesant Recap

The 2023 Benefit for Stuyvesant took place on Tuesday, May 23, 2023 at Tribeca Rooftop where multiple generations of alumni, parents, faculty, and friends of Stuyvesant gathered to honor notable Stuy alumni and celebrate Our Strong Band. Thanks to the generosity of our alumni and supporters, we raised over \$325,000 for Stuyvesant!

Our list of honorees included an internationally-renowned entrepreneur and video game developer who is an advocate for sustainable energy solutions, an MD/PhD candidate within the NIH Medical Scientist Training Program at NYU Grossman School of Medicine and former Black Students League President at Stuyvesant, and a beloved Tech teacher who has taught at Stuyvesant since 1984. You can read more about each of our four Pegleg honorees below.

Henk Rogers '72 (Golden Pegleg Award) has had an illustrious career in

computer gaming, which began three decades ago when he revolutionized Japan's video game industry and created "The Black Onyx," Japan's first role-playing game. However, he is best known as the man who turned a little-known game called Tetris into an international phenomenon. The story of his high-stake negotiations with the Soviet Union and Nintendo is the subject of a recent Apple TV+ blockbuster, "Tetris." A near-fatal heart attack in 2005 led Henk to discover his true missions in life and he has since dedicated his career to the research, development, and implementation of renewable energy sources in his home state of Hawaii and around the world. Today, Henk is the founder of 10 companies and non-profit organizations focused on renewable energy, space exploration, and ending the use of fossil fuels on Earth.

Nina Uzoigwe '17 (Young Pegleg Award) captured national attention for being accepted to seven lvy

League schools while at Stuyvesant. graduated ultimately She Harvard University in 2021 as a John Harvard Scholar (awarded to the top 5% of her class) and concentrated in Bioengineering with a Secondary in Global Health and Health Policy. Her senior thesis, which won the Thomas T. Hoopes Prize (an award which recognizes outstanding scholarly work or research by students selected by a committee of faculty from Harvard University's Faculty of Arts and Sciences) examined pulmonary replacement in neonates valve with congenital heart defects at Boston Children's Hospital. This work additionally received the Dean's Award in Bioengineering, which is the highest honor bestowed to students within the S.B. Engineering Program. As a current medical student, she is completing her clinical rotations and is looking forward to obtaining a PhD in cardiology. She aims to use her education to advocate, bridge and expand research, clinical, and social sectors, and address the cardiovascular burden present in Black/African American communities in New York City and the world at large.

James "Jim" Lonardo (Outstanding Teacher Award) has taught at Stuyvesant since 1984. A well-loved Tech teacher, he has also served as Senior Coordinator, Coordinator of Technology, and faculty advisor for the yearbook, The Indicator. In 2003, he became the coach of Stuyvesant's award-winning FIRST Robotics Team. While he initially only wanted to facilitate logistics, he eventually brought his expertise in technical drawing and CAD to the students. Without his skills, the team's robot would have never accomplished as much as it has today.

During the past two decades, Mr. Lonardo has been volunteering overtime so that the team's engineering division can build the best robot. He literally goes the extra mile by driving the robot to and from the NYC Regional each year, alongside organizing all essential forms. Without Mr. Lonardo, the team wouldn't even be able to compete! To commemorate his almost 40 years of teaching at Stuyvesant and 20 years of mentoring the team, StuyPulse's robot this past year, "Jim", is named after him!

Outstanding Alumnus: Arthur Blank '60 Chairman, Arthur M. Blank Family Foundation



Arthur Blank '60, recipient of the 2024 Golden Pegleg Award

Perhaps best known as co-founder of The Home Depot, **Arthur Blank '60** is now widely recognized for his diverse businesses. Named by ESPN as the 2021 Sports Philanthropist of the Year, Blank is a tireless advocate of using purpose and profit hand-in-hand to benefit the communities around him. Blank has been distinguished by Forbes as one of the World's 100 Greatest Living Business Minds 2017, Sports Business Journal's Executive of the Year 2018 and Sports Business Journal's one of the 50 Most Influential People in Sports 2016, 2017, 2018.

In addition to the Blank Family Foundation, Blank's Family of Businesses includes the Atlanta Falcons and Atlanta United; the nationwide PGA TOUR Superstore; three ranches in Montana – Mountain Sky Guest Ranch, West Creek Ranch and Paradise Valley Ranch; and Mercedes-Benz Stadium, which hosted the 2019 Super Bowl and is home to the Falcons and Atlanta United.

In 2020, Blank released his book *Good Company*, a national best-seller, highlighting how the core values successfully used to the build The Home Depot can be applied to varying businesses. Blank believes in the importance of making a difference – professionally and personally. In addition to the company's financial success, during his 23 years with The Home Depot the company donated more than \$113 million to communities, while associates participated in hundreds of thousands of hours of volunteer time. Blank is applying the same business acumen and values in building his competitive, successful and community-oriented businesses today.

Blank has been distinguished by Forbes as one of the World's 100 Greatest Living Business Minds 2017, Sports Business Journal's Executive of the Year 2018 and Sports Business Journal's one of the 50 Most Influential People in Sports 2016, 2017, 2018.

Blank is dedicated to his own giving back. Since 1995, the Arthur M. Stuyvesant and Environmental Sustainability: New Classes and Science Lab


The new Environmental Science Lab has been designed to be a hydroponics, aquaponics and coral reef ecology center. It will allow for a substantial increase in the number of environmental science and engineering courses offered at Stuyvesant, together with an increase in the standard of instruction and our students' ability to engage in environmental science and sustainability research.

The new lab allows Stuyvesant to meet its goal of being able to offer AP Environmental Science (APES) to all incoming freshmen, which requires us to have a facility where we can host 5 sections of the program every day. As a result, our students will be able to take more advanced science classes earlier, as well as engage much earlier on in environmental science and engineering research projects, especially those that can be competitive for the national Regeneron Science Talent Search (FKA Westinghouse or Intel). The lab will also allow us to develop a school-wide hub for activities related to pressing 21st-century environmental sustainability challenges, including those facing New York City. We envision the lab as becoming a nucleus for new environmentally-focused student clubs, a place where we can host sustainability-focused hackathons and design challenges, and an impetus for the school to develop new curricula that explore the roles of art, policy and communications in environmental sustainability, for example.

We plan to use the lab to host monthly events for elementary, middle, and high school students, which will be run by our students. In addition, we will host environmentally-focused summer programs for students of all ages, using our students as counselors.

Designed by the School Construction Authority, the design of the space includes a classroom and an accompanying wet lab space. The Environmental Science Classroom will be used for the recitation periods of AP Environmental classes, both the freshman and the junior sections. The classroom will likely be used all 10 periods of the school day. Though not all sections of APES will be able to have recitation here, all sections will have their lab periods scheduled in the new Wet Lab located next door to the classroom. We also expect that the oceanography and nutrition classes will be able to schedule time in the Wetlab during the semester to run more hands-on inquiry-based activities.

Principal Yu and Biology Teacher Ms. Marissa Maggio have been speaking with teachers from a number of middle schools around the city, including I.S. 145 Joseph Pulitzer, P.S. 150, I.S. 190, and The Queens School of Inquiry about cross-collaboration. Ideas for programs are field trips and tours of the lab, intro to hydroponics and/or plant anatomy, and building a water bottle planter to take seedlings home; multi-week weekend programming that ties into Next Generation Science Standards and the new Amplify Curriculum that many junior high schools are adapting; and weeklong summer sessions focused on hydroponics/coral ecology/nutrition. Many teachers are interested in long-term programming as well, and especially for a way to bring back what they learn at Stuy to their own schools.

The projected cost of the lab is \$1.2 million, and about \$800,000 has been raised to date. We are actively looking for alumni and friends to invest in this important area of science at the school. 30 Years of Graduating Classes from the New Building

The Stuyvesant Coalition soon recognized that the only alternative was to move to a new site. In their search, they came across the Battery Park City Authority (BPCA), who offered Stuyvesant a 1.5-acre lot on Chambers Street. Back then, Battery Park City, built on the landfill from the World Trade Center construction site, was still relatively underdeveloped. The offered space was generous, but the Coalition was worried about the location of the site west of a busy, multilane highway (West Street). Principal Baumel and the Coalition, including the Volckhausen family, pressed hard for the construction of a pedestrian bridge over the highway and only agreed to the move when the BPCA promised to fund the construction of the TriBeCa Bridge.

Professional Development Powered by Alumni

For the 2023-24 school year, the Alumni Mentoring Program, started in 2014 by **YanJie Hou '06**, returned to in-person cohorts and workshops for the first time since 2020.

This year's program had over 260 participants across 10 different cohorts, inclusive of Mentor Leaders led by Program Co-Director **Bill Weiss '80** as well as Student Leaders that previously took part in the program as mentees. Thanks to our 80 volunteer mentors and the Alumni Association's loyal supporters, your donations funded almost 4,000 hours of programming for the Program's 160+ mentees.

Even though the program shifted back to in-person activities, we offered a virtual option for mentees whose commute and schedule made it hard for them to attend in-person cohorts as well as for dedicated and consistent mentors from outside of NYC who have been mentoring virtually with the Program since 2020.

The structure of SHSAA's Alumni Mentoring Program is optimized by a diversity of alumni backgrounds and experiences. Each mentor is paired with one to two mentees and each of these mentor/mentee groups discuss different topics with seven to ten other mentor/mentee groups within a cohort. The rationale behind the structure is that each mentee is not just receiving attention from his/her/their assigned mentor, but they can interact and hear from all the mentors in the cohort at key moments over the course of the program.

This year, mentees also enjoyed the return of some workshops that can only be done in person, such as Public Speaking and

Life Skills. "From our feedback surveys of the workshops, we can tell that mentees really enjoy the interactive components of these in-person workshops. Instead of just listening to a presentation of best practices for public speaking over Zoom, the in-person format allowed them to actually put theory to practice and give a short speech in front of 40-50 of their peers and alumni mentors and receive real-time feedback," said YanJie Hou of the Public Speaking Workshop.

For most students of the Alumni Mentoring Program, it is a one-year commitment that they move on from once they've finished the core curriculum. However, for some students who appreciate the Program so much, they not only come back as a mentee for multiple semesters but apply to become Student Leaders (SL) of the Program to help run and organize the Program for future years. Following is the experience of **Emily Lu '23** who was with the Program for all four years of her Stuyvesant experience (two as a mentee, two on the student leadership team) and how she gained important skills and found community within the Alumni Mentoring Program.

MENTORING

From Emily Lu '23:

J joined the Mentoring Program in freshman year. It was my first taste of the real adulting world – J was attending meetings and speaking to adults, and J had deliverables for people other than my teachers who held me accountable for my responsibilities. There was even an evaluation of me other than my grades and classroom participation. Although J was fearful at first, J really enjoyed my time as a mentee, and learned how to keep myself organized.

I appreciated my time in the Program so much that I returned as a mentee in my sophomore year. Then, in my junior year, I became a Student Leader (SL). Being a SL taught me a whole new skillset - I learned to check my email once every morning, afternoon and night. Communication was key, now, more than ever. I had to evaluate my

email etiquette often as I communicated with both my mentor leader, senior student leaders, mentors, mentees and sometimes parents. After my summer internship, I realized that being an SL was most similar to what you would actually do when you enter the workforce.

By my senior year, I had become a Senior Student Leader (SSL) and Vice-President of the Program. In this role, I started to develop my management and planning skills. Being an SSL encapsulated some of my firsts, like moderating a workshop and presenting in front of an audience of 100+. Being a part of the Program was a big part of my high school career and it helped shape who I am today. I now have a functioning resume and have much more confidence in myself. Overall, I've learned a lot from my four years in the Program – met many people who I will continue to be inspired by, and carry skills that I know will be essential in my future, no matter where I work or where I go.

Despite these disadvantages, with the help of the Alumni Association, my tutor at Kweller Prep, **Sebastian Acevedo '23**, and my own determination, I am blessed to have the opportunity to attend Stuyvesant High School." His favorite parts of ar of the Stuy Experience, has been developing relationships with teachers. "My favorite class would be Global Studies with Mr. Tillman. I enjoy how Mr. Tillman teaches his class and how his teaching style matches my learning style."

Jonathan is looking forward to connecting next with Mr. Harvey Blumm about the internship opportunities available this school year, not just to earn some money but also to start getting into the routine of managing school and work.

Zifei Zhao '23: An Example of Stuyvesant Excellence

Meet Zifei Zhao '23, recipient of the 2023 Wexler Howard Scholarship and the 2023 Sylvia Elkin and Mildred Kwatinetz Scholarship. She currently a freshman at Georgetown University in Washington, DC, a short train ride from York City, but miles away from her birthplace, Guanadona, China. She arrived in NYC with her family at just three years old, and

spent her first years in the City, living in a house with 17 other people. "It was sort of like a great migration of my entire family moving together over the years and we all ended up at this one house," said Zifei. During her time there, she slowly began getting used to the new culture and language.

When they moved into their own house a few years later, Zifei's grandmother would take her to the library to take advantage of the free air conditioning. "I credit the library a lot for my education because tiny me was just walking through every single aisle, checking every book. And I would crane my neck to look at all the titles. At some point, I read the dictionary as an actual book," said Zifei. "That's where I think my love of education and learning started simply because of my economic status growing up. That's what influenced me."

Zifei remembers growing up with food stamps and going to soup kitchens, but also being surrounded by a lot of love, for which she is very grateful. She can't help but note how her younger brother, currently ten, is experiencing a much different upbringing. "My parents have really achieved the American dream. We own a house. We have a car. They have good stable jobs. And I'm grateful for that. But the surreal thing is that my brother is growing up in this American dream, while I grew up with a family who was chasing the American dream. So the stark contrast between the way I grew up versus the way my brother is growing up is very important in my mind."

When she first arrived at Stuy, Zifei was drawn to *The Spectator* due to her interest in writing and photography. When she attended *The Spectator's* orientation, she knew she had found the right club for her. By the end of that year, she applied to be the Photo Editor and got the position.

"Because of photography, I've been able to meet these amazing people who do robotics until 10pm, people who do theater and are amazing singers, people who do crazy research. And I can't believe I'm in a building with such amazing people that I get to call my classmates. It's really expanded my love for Stuy."

Zifei also wrote for several departments. "The community for *The Spectator* is awesome because you're surrounded by so many people who are passionate about so many things because you can literally write about anything in the newspaper," said Zifei.

Now at Georgetown, Zifei wasn't sure what she would be studying. "I was very much undecided for a really long time. But I think because of my immigrant background, I wanted to study International Relations." And her reasons are very personal, "I want to find ways to help women and minorities achieve their educational and professional goals on an international and global scale." Her grandmother had seven children and had always dreamed of being a teacher but wasn't able to due to her economic status. "I realized I'm so lucky and privileged. I can achieve my dreams of whatever I want to be."

Another reason she was attracted to International Relations is that she sees it as a blend of both STEM and humanities. "You have to know a lot about what's going on politically, but also what's going on scientifically," she explained. "What are the new technological advances happening? And especially with Al and cybersecurity, which are global issues. I find myself not being able to choose between humanities and STEM, I chose International Relations so that I get to do both."

2023 StuyPrep: Supporting The Next Generation

StuyPrep, an alumni initiative founded by **Kent Kim '05** and **Christina Alfonso '01**, seeks to raise the visibility of the specialized high schools, especially Stuyvesant, within underprivileged communities throughout New York City in an effort to make our school an attractive alternative for historically underrepresented families. We aim to empower students with access to free tutoring, a shared sense of community, and a heightened awareness of the benefits of the specialized high school network.

The Alumni Association's ongoing commitment to diversity and inclusion under the leadership of Executive Director **Diego Segalini '98** and SHSAA Diversity Committee Chair **Renee Stevens '89** is incrementally scaling the program up to pre-pandemic levels. Last year, the SHSAA with the support of donors, underwrote seats for 24 students with Kweller Prep. The program ended up serving 32 students, and 5 were admitted to specialized high schools – 4 to Stuyvesant and 1 to Bronx Science. The students who earned admission to a specialized high school came from Queens Central Academy and Robert F. Kennedy Middle School, neither of which are feeder schools for Stuyvesant.

Recently, the program served 75 students within a student pool that was more diverse and with students coming from a wider range of schools. Each student received over 60 hours of instruction over the course of six months. They attended classes virtually on Saturdays in May and June; in-person at our partner locations over the summer months; and in-person at Stuyvesant in the fall. During the summer, middle-schoolers were introduced to Stuyvesant students from ARISTA, Stuyvesant's Honor Society, who continued to

coach them in the fall. Students took the SHSAT in November and December and will find out their results in the spring. Next year we aim to serve closer to 100 students, to continue to work with multiple providers – Bee Tutored, CAS Prep, Five Points Learning, Helicon, and Kweller Prep - and with a goal of having a similar outcome in testing on a percentage basis.

As part of the program, SHSAA staff built a rapport with parents and guardians of students that participated in the program. Our hope is that it fosters a deeper connection with families in our effort of making Stuyvesant more accessible in addition to helping us understand the results of our initiative. SHSAA's Executive Director, Diego Segalini, notes, "To make this initiative successful, it's imperative that our support of one community does not come at the expense of another. While we are focused on under-represented communities, we seek to empower all communities that have been marginalized." The Alumni Association envisions Stuyvesant High School as the #1 choice for all NYC students seeking an incomparable education in STEM, the Arts and Humanities, and more.





1938: Jackson Pokress, a 67-year member of the North Massapequa Fire Department, challenged the conventional wisdom that everyone is replaceable. Pokress, a threeterm North Massapequa fire commissioner, World War II combat photographer, and local newspaper owner, died of natural causes on May 13, 2023. He was 102. His love for photography began as a teenager when he would walk around the city snapping photos. He received his B.A. from New York University in 1942. He enlisted in the Army after hearing about Pearl Harbor, skipping his January college j. Fifty years later, NYU invited him back to graduation to walk across the stage and get his diploma in person.

1941: On Saturday, October 15, 2022 Kachas "Kach" Derdiarian, a beloved husband, father, and grandfather, passed away at the age of 99. During World War II, he served as a flight engineer on a PB2Y Coronado airplane in the US Navy from November 1942 to January 1946. He was part of Operation Lifeline in the South Pacific. Upon returning from the war, he married his lovely next-door neighbor, Kay, with whom he recently celebrated their 75th wedding anniversary on August 16. He graduated from the Academy of Aeronautics in 1946 and completed his engineering studies at Brooklyn Polytechnic Institute. He was a lifetime member in the American Society of Mechanical Engineers. He worked as an engineer for Pan American Airways in New York, Lockheed in California where he worked on the C130 and F104 Starfighter aircraft, Loral Electronics in New York, Microwave Associates (MACOM) in Massachusetts, and finished his career at General Dynamics in Connecticut where he worked on Ohio and Los Angeles class submarines. One of his projects for NASA was the lunar soil sampling system of the Surveyor spacecraft, which laid the groundwork for the Apollo program and is on exhibit at the Smithsonian Museum.

1943: J. Myron "Mike" Atkin, a former dean and professor emeritus at Stanford Graduate School of Education (GSE), died on Aug. 18, 2022 in Palo Alto. He was 95. Atkin, who began his working life as a high school science teacher, devoted his research career to improving the quality of science education in K-12 schools. As dean of the GSE, he was known for his commitment to bridging education research with the dayto-day realities of classroom practice. With former Stanford President Donald Kennedy, he launched a landmark initiative in 1982 that connected GSE faculty with local high school teachers and administrators for education research, a project that drew national attention for involving school practitioners at every level of the process. Widely regarded as a warm, welcoming leader who frequently hosted students and faculty for meals at his home with his wife, Ann, he served as dean from 1979 to 1986, then stayed on the faculty until he retired in 2004.

1943: Irving (Red) Lipner, age 95, died peacefully at home on November 19, 2022. Anyone who met him knew that he was proud and passionate about his family and his many decades working at The New York Times, the paper he loved. Red was a rarity: after working at several other papers, he joined The New York Times as a linotype operator before getting his M.A. in Journalism. He served as an editor on the National Desk where he worked for many years – he still shared tales of getting great stories to press before deadline long after his retirement. Red continued to read The New York Times religiously, including perusing the obituaries. He was a firm believer that everyone was a piece of history.

1944: Harry A. McLaughlin, a diehard fan of the New York Yankees, got to live a dream last summer when he was honored as the Veteran of the Game at Yankee Stadium on Old-Timers' Day. During the seventh-inning stretch of the July 30 game between the Yankees and the Kansas City Royals, a photo of McLaughlin as a young sailor flashed on the jumbotron and tens of thousands of fans stood up and cheered, as "God Bless America" boomed through the stadium. Sitting in the living room at his daughter Debi's home in The Villages, FL, his eyes welled with tears as he stared in disbelief at the TV screen. His family says the fact that he lived to see his beloved team bestow the honor made his death at age 96 on April 29, 2023 hurt a little less.

1945: Dr. Richard J. Goldstein, beloved father, professor, and researcher passed away on March 6, 2023, in Minneapolis at the age of 94. A renowned mechanical engineer and academic, his contributions to heat transfer measurement techniques and film cooling led to improved efficiency in gas turbines and many other thermal systems. Richard loved black coffee, the Minnesota Vikings, the theater and classical music, traveling with his children, and chasing solar eclipses. He received his B.S. in Mechanical Engineering (1950) and Physics (1951) from the University of Minnesota. He joined Oak Ridge National Laboratory as a Development Engineer in 1951, serving afterward in the US Army as a first lieutenant for two years. Richard returned to the University of Minnesota in 1956 and received his Ph.D. in Mechanical Engineering, joining the University's faculty in 1961. He served as a professor, researcher, and department head in the coming years and was named Janes J. Ryan and Regents' Professor Emeritus. Richard's recognitions include multiple honorary doctoral degrees, membership in the National Academy of Engineering and serving as president of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers, president of the International Centre for Heat and Mass Transfer, and president of the Assembly for International Heat Transfer Conferences. He advised 74 doctoral and 82 master's students, along with many visiting and postdoctoral scholars, and his work was presented in more than 300 publications.

1947: Leonard Mactas passed away peacefully on July 25, 2022 at the age of 92. He lived a full life, with unwavering love for each member of his family, making a lasting impression and difference in their lives. Prior to his retirement, Len had a stellar career as a consulting actuary with Kwasha Lipton, an employee benefits consulting firm, where he was a pioneer in a burgeoning field, culminating with him leading the firm to great success and an outstanding reputation. There was never a problem he could not solve.

1950: Alan Sussman passed away at the age of 90 on May 12, 2023 in Merwick Care and Rehabilitation Center in Plainsboro, NJ. He received a bachelor's degree in chemistry from Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute and a Ph.D. in physical chemistry from Yale University. He moved to the Princeton area in 1958 to accept a position as a Member of Technical Staff at the then RCA Sarnoff Laboratories (now


SRI International). During his long career at the Sarnoff Labs, Alan worked on several important problems in the optimal design of liquid crystalline materials and their use in displays of various types, including TVs. Liquid crystals also played an important role in his personal life, as he met his future wife, Martha, at a liquid crystal conference.

1952: Sir Richard V. Giordano KBE, an iconic American business leader who led a transformation of British corporate culture, creator of the BOC Challenge sailing race, and Knight Commander of the British Empire for his contributions to British industry, died on December 27, 2022 at 88 years of age in Florida, surrounded by his family. Born to Italian immigrants, he was a proud product of New York City public schools, later graduating from Harvard College in 1956 and Columbia Law School in 1959. Despite having rheumatic fever as a child, Giordano developed into a tall and athletic young man, discovering sailing and playing football in high school. These talents earned him a scholarship at Harvard College to continue his studies following the death of his father at the end of his freshman year. After working as a lawyer at Shearman & Sterling in New York City, Giordano took a job with a client, Airco, a then Fortune 500 firm, being named President by the age of 37. Overseas competitor BOC (British Oxygen Corp) launched a hostile takeover for Airco in 1978, and won. Instead of losing his job, he was invited to London to run the merged companies and became Britain's highest paid executive. This earned him notoriety in the British press long after his salary was surpassed by others and he transitioned to non-executive Chairman in 1994. He never lost his affection for the medical gasses industry, taking pride in the innovative anesthetics his company developed, and quizzing family members facing surgery on their anesthetists' choice of sedation. During his time at BOC, Giordano launched a new sailing race, the BOC Challenge "Around Alone," the longest single-handed event in the world and the first round the world race to start and finish in the USA. BOC sponsored the race in 1982, 1986, 1990, and 1994. To him, the sailors in the race embodied the values of courage, perseverance, and resourcefulness that he admired both in business and in life. Giordano retired from his fulltime leadership role at the BOC Group in 1990 and received an honorary knighthood - Knight Commander of the Order of the British Empire -

in 1989. This reflected not only his contributions to British industry but also leadership on the UK Central Electricity Generating Board and as Executive Director of National Power.

1961: Harvey Pitt, 78, former U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) chairman and longtime advisory board member of JBS USA, died May 30, 2023. Pitt graduated from Brooklyn College with a B.A. in 1965, and from St. John's University School of Law with a J.D. in 1968. He later received the Presidential Medal of Distinction from Brooklyn College in 2003, and an honorary LL.D. from St. John's University School of Law. From 1968 to 1978, Pitt served on the staff of the SEC and became the agency's youngest general counsel in 1975 at age 30. He served as SEC chairman for 18 months between 2001 and 2003, overseeing the agency in the aftermath of the 9/11 terrorist attacks and the response to the corporate accounting crises of the 1990s. Later in life, Pitt was a columnist with Compliance Week and, at the time of his death, was CEO of the strategic consulting firm that he founded, Kalorama Partners LLC. At various times in his life, he taught at Georgetown University and the University of Pennsylvania.

1964: Chancellor Emeritus Robert J. Zimmer, University of Chicago's 13th president from 2006 to 2021, passed away on May 23, 2023. A pioneering mathematician, Zimmer spent nearly four decades at the University as a faculty member and administrator, most recently serving as the Edwin A. and Betty L. Bergman Distinguished Service Professor in the Department of Mathematics and the College. His tenure will be remembered for his strategic brilliance in bringing about changes for the long-term benefit of the University community.

Among his remarkable catalog of accomplishments, he led transformational efforts to increase educational access and financial support for students, including the creation of the Odyssey Scholarship Program in 2007, which supported financial aid for students in the greatest need. Under his leadership the University established its first engineering program, the Pritzker School of Molecular Engineering; expanded its global presence through new centers in Beijing, Delhi, and Hong Kong; greatly increased its work in civic engagement, including partnerships with the city of Chicago and organizations on the South Side; and made broad investments in programs and facilities in the arts.

1987: Michael Wayne Bronowitz, age 51, of Las Vegas, died June 30, 2021. Michael was born June 10, 1970 in Brooklyn, NY to the late Barry and Miriam Bronowitz. He worked in sales for Verizon Communications. Tired of the New York winters, he moved to Las Vegas in 2011. Michael had a strong, friendly personality. He was a Master Mason and loved the Las Vegas Golden Knights, shooting, playing poker, politics, and cooking. His older brother Philip Bronowitz, MD '69, informs us that in June 2021, as the Golden Knights were battling the Montreal Canadiens in the Stanley Cup Semifinals, Michael died due to the COVID-19 virus. One of his final requests to his wife, Connie, before he was admitted into the hospital was, if things didn't go well for him, to bring the Cup to his grave. Then, when Golden Knights were crowned Stanley Cup Champions at T-Mobile Arena on June 13, 2023, Connie Bronowitz knew exactly what she had to do. A week after that historic day, Bronowitz - a Golden Knights season-ticket holder since the franchise's inception in 2016 - reached out to team president Kerry Bubolz with a request: To bring the Stanley Cup to her late husband's gravesite. After going back and forth for a few months, Bubolz and Bronowitz nailed down the logistics and had the Cup visit Michael's grave at Bunker's Memory Gardens Memorial Park on September 8. The family spent 15 minutes with the Cup at Michael's decorated gravestone honoring his last wish, even placing a photo of him inside the trophy.
